Tracey Whare – Implementing the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples – recent developments in international law

Tracey will talk about the September 2014 resolution of the UN General Assembly committing to concrete outcomes to implement the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples. Engagement of indigenous peoples in the drafting of the resolution was often contested by states. However, indigenous peoples launched a global platform of engagement and used the opportunity to participate in ways that the UN had not considered before.
